Emptying to Find Fullness Preparation for the Holy Days and a New Year

Savata? (Are you satisfied?)
Savati! (I am!)

I felt like this word followed me around Israel this summer.

From our first meal, to the Haftarah of Isaiah and the lament of Jeremiah on Tisha b'Av, the challenge posed was to be satisfied without being complacent. How to be satisfied with a gratitude that keeps one humble and able to be focused without cravings and distractions that threaten to keep us from our holy path. To be satisfied within oneself, no matter what is happening on the outside, so you can respond in holy and healthy ways.

Savata? Are you there? Can you be sated and still yearn to know and experience the holy in everything you do? Satedness can lead us away from holiness but Judaism doesn't ask us to become ascetic or to deny ourselves the bounty of the land. Rather it asks us to see and name the blessing in the plenty so it can take us to generosity, keeping us aware that body and soul need to be nourished by gratitude and experiencing god in everything.

We begin with the simplest of actions--eating. When we eat without intention we cannot be satisfied. We can all think of times when we have eaten, maybe even been full but are not satisfied. We cannot say, *savati*. Eat and bless our tradition tells us, sharing with us a secret that when we eat each bite with intention, we release sparks that nourish the soul as well as feeding the body. We were very aware of eating in Israel because most of our servers were Muslims fasting for Ramadan. We ate

in their presence with humility and gratitude trying to acknowledge how difficult it must have been for them to serve while fasting for such long hot days. Then on Tisha b'Av, (the 9th of Av), when we fast, there was this curious feeling of satisfaction that came from the connection, the solidarity, with the other. I was hungry and cranky but if you had asked me *savata?* I would have answered, *savati*.

The Torah warns us that when we come into the Land, there will be plenty for us but if we don't remember where we came from, if we forget what a wonder it is, we will not be satisfied. Why? It's not just that there will be plenty as opposed to the scarcity of our wanderings and we will take for granted what we have and forget where we have come from. Many of the generation born during the great depression never got over the scrimping and saving even when they didn't have to. My mother was born in 1929 and long after she really did not have to worry about getting a deal or a bargain, she delighted in saving a few bucks even when it cost her so much more in time and energy to get that deal or discount. That kind of remembering is deep and not easily forgotten. I think the warning is more about forgetting the lessons learned in the lean years that taught us what was really important. We learned that when we had little we could still be happy. When we had less, we were grateful for what we had and not focused on what we didn't have. We realized it wasn't about the stuff, it was about the relationships, the meaning found in the

moments not distracted by our stuff. Out there in the *midbar* (wilderness), we knew what was important; the air, the water, the fire and family. We were satisfied. *Savata? Savati*. Ask a child who gets so many gifts so much stuff if they are satisfied. They will tell you it's never enough. Ask a child who has one special thing. It fills them. *Savati*, they tell you.

I wonder if the violence we are experiencing comes in some part from an emptiness inside. From an inability to be satisfied within oneself from a culture that feeds the need for more and more: more attention, more stimulation. Addiction gone to a destructive level, like a drug that one becomes so used to you need more to achieve the same effect. We know that these are physical responses and that some people are more vulnerable than others to addiction. Hate and violence are born of souls that do not know how to be sated, souls that cannot accept the and-and in the world, the other, with humility.

Savata? we ask them.

No. *Lo Savati*, I am not satisfied, and I will try to fill this empty space with addictions that hurt me and with actions that hurt others until I am satisfied. Until I feel noticed, until I feel full.

We all know people who cannot get enough love, food, substance, attention. Those who are in the midst of plenty in the land but are not sated. The root is *shin-bet-ayin*. Seven, the number that symbolizes wholeness. It is also the root for an oath and warns us of those whose words cannot be trusted because they are not whole within themselves.

Remember the story about the man who wanted to know the secret of living with serenity in the midst of a broken world? He asked his rabbi how he could sleep at night knowing the suffering that is out there. Knowing that any moment tragedy could strike him or someone he loves? "Go see Reb Chaim," the rabbi tells him, "he will help you." Reb Chaim, the man thinks, isn't he the man who lost everything? His job and his wealth, his family, like Job? The man found Reb Chaim living in a cardboard box. He watched for a while as Chaim collected scraps of bread and food and shared them with his cardboard box

neighbors. "I'm so sorry to bother you, the rabbi told me that you would have the secret of living with serenity even with suffering. How to be sated when you have nothing. How not to live in fear, knowing how broken the world is. Reb Chaim, replied, "I'm not sure why he sent you to me. As you can see, *savati*. I have what I need. There are many worse off than me."

The teachings of Torah are worried that when we enter the land we will depend too much on her plenty and forget that the true satisfaction comes from within. That it comes from humility. That it comes from remembering where we came from and that the way to satedness is through gratitude and service to others.

It's worried that the wheat and the barley, the pomegranate and figs and olive oil and date honey will spoil us. But the answer is not to deny us these wonderful delights. The answer is to bless them, to circumcise our hearts, it says, to keep them vulnerable and open, to not be afraid and to share our blessings with all those we can that when we are asked *savata?* we will answer, *savati*.

As we prepare for our New Year, may it ready us to bring our gifts of kindness and compassion, of humility and hope that this year will be a good year, a healthy year and a year of peace for all.
